I would like to extend a heartfelt thank you to the many club members who helped with the trail clean-up and preparation on Saturday, October 26th and Saturday, November 2nd. On the first Saturday, our efforts were focused on the new trail section created this summer on the Georgian Bluffs Old Landfill Site. Many roots were removed along with some tenacious stumps that I missed when the bulldozer was through in early September. On the second Saturday, the entire trail system had a good going over. This included removing many saplings that would eventually encroach on the trail as well as extracting the larger pieces of residual garbage found in a few locations on the new trail section. After that work, all the trails were ready for grooming.

I would like to thank Leo Verschuren for his efforts to organize and manage our signage and Thom Hakala for his graphic design. We were well ahead of schedule to get our signage in place for the upcoming season. The new trail created last year will be signed as "Humpty Dumpty". The new trail created this year will be temporarily signed "New Trail" since it is yet to be named. This new trail (see map) has a short but strenuous loop attached to it which will be temporarily named "Short Strenuous Loop". This loop will be perfect for anyone who is seeking serious muscle fatigue! The loop has a decent hill and no time to recover should you choose to be stuck in the loop!

The "New Trail" has been designated as a "Black" trail which is considered difficult. This is largely due to the

sharp left hand turn at the bottom of the second hill. The "Short Strenuous Loop" also offers fairly steep hills. The remainder of the trail is moderate to easy with some pleasant flat sections through mature hardwood and some larger White Pine. Be ready for the sharp left!

Another item of note: The Equipment Shed had an upgrade to its electrical service and now has a 100 amp panel. What this means for those hosting races is that there is now enough power to run wax irons and crockpots at the same time without the circuit breakers going off.

This is a reminder that there is an A.E.D. available onsite in Gerry's Place (The Cabin). The location of our A.E.D. has been shifted to the right along the back wall. It will be more accessible from the door and less likely to contact anyone's head when getting up from the corner bench.

Grooming Report

Grooming has started given the wonderful December snow! We groom daily unless the weather is wrong for the snow. Rain and temperatures above 0C do stop grooming as we only make a mess of any snow under these conditions.

With the New Trail being completed in the old dump area this adds 2 km of trail to groom (excellent!). Adding in the 1.1 km of Humpty Dumpty last season, this extra 3.1 km of trail can lead to an additional hour of grooming time. Depending on snow fall and conditions it can easily take 4+ hours to groom all the trails. We typically schedule two groomers in order to shorten the time to get around all the trails and get the machines out of the way.

If you are a morning skier, the typical grooming approach is as follows: Jack Rabbit, Two Way, Paperclip, Easy Street, Sidewinder, Hairpin, Kiwanis, Christmas Tree, Humpty Dumpty, New Trail, Grunt, Yo Yo, Bypass, Sheldon's. The Stadium gets started after Jackrabbit on our way to Two Way and typically gets finished at the end of grooming. The connections are periodically groomed.

After a major snow dump it takes a lot of work to get the trails ready as we first have to pack the snow using the snowmobiles before letting the grooming machines do their thing. So on those days you may see anywhere from 2 - 4 machines out.

Thank you to all the members who wave to the groomers or stop to give them feedback. Our goal is to give you the best snow to have a great ski.

Masters Skiing

This year the Canadian Masters Championships are being hosted by the Whitehorse Nordic Ski Club from February 19 - 23, 2025. Whitehorse is an amazing place to visit any time of the year but for avid cross-country skiers it has much to offer. In fact ,they have been on snow for almost three weeks now! Whitehorse Nordic has a great event planned. Registration for these championships is available through Zone4 as of Friday, November 15.

The Ontario Masters Championships will be hosted by North Bay Nordic Ski Club February 07-09, 2025. The races for this event will be Friday 02/07 10 km MST C; Saturday 02/08 am 20 km MST C; Saturday 02/08 pm 10 km MST F, and ; Sunday 02/09 am 20 km MST F. Canadian Ski Marathon

Are you looking for an adventure, a winter holiday, a challenge? Maybe all three? If so, consider taking part in the 59th edition of the legendary Canadian Ski Marathon on February 08-09, 2025. It is not a race against other skiers. It is a friendly ski tour, held over 2 days in the Montebello area of Quebec, about an hour from Ottawa.

It is divided into 5 sections each day and is wellsupported, with check points, food, fluids, bus transportation, and first aid readily available. Each section is approximately 16 kms long. The CSM offers something for everyone. The event has multiple categories of participation. Some people want to experience a 'taste' of the event and do one section per day. Others will ski 2, 3, or 4 sections per day. Skiers in the Coureur des Bois category ski all 160 km over 2 days. The Gold CdB participants carry a pack with their equipment and food to camp outside on the Saturday night.

The event is held in the Laurentians, on the north shore of the Ottawa River. The trail runs mostly through rolling, forested, hills and across small lakes in beautiful rural Quebec. Many of the well groomed trails are skied on only once a year.

All they need to do is register (\$25) for Ontario Masters Crosscountry Ski Association and they automatically are part of the Canadian association. If they are super keen, they could still register for the World Masters Cup in Klosters Switzerland!

As there has been for many years, there is an Ontario Masters Point Series (see <u>http://onmastersxcski.blogspot.com/</u> for all the latest info on Masters Skiing in Ontario). New this year though is an initiative between Canadian Masters and Nordiq Canada to create a Masters Points List, which is similar to the Canadian Points List for standard licence holders (FIS or Nordiq Canada).



Did you know....?

The Sawmill Trail was declared an official Canadian Ski Marathon training trail 3 years ago and is included in the CSM trail listing.

Mark Powell


